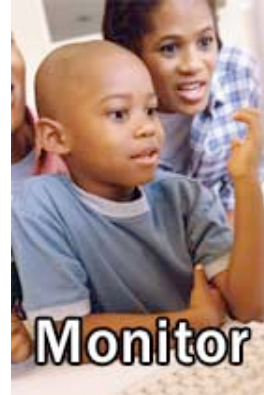

If a Web site does not exist in the database, it is dynamically rated and categorized on the fly.
